OBJECTIVES

- Foster employability of young learners and employees in the Health sector providing them with the new Data Protection Skills Sets
- Enhance transparency, comparability and harmonization of Sectoral skills and qualifications of data protection employees, providing a new Occupational Profile which includes the new "soft skills" needed in the data privacy area.
- Support the setting-up of two new VET Curricula
- Create a standardized VET Certification for DPOs that is going to validate the abilities and competences of potential Sector employees.
- Develop a new Work Based Learning Scheme

IMPORTANCE

- Patients' fundamental right to protection of their health data is an important issue since eHealth services are the hot topic of today's society.
- **Health and genetic data** belong to the category of 'sensitive data' and unauthorised disclosure of personal health information could negatively influence the individual patient's personal and professional life.
- A minority of respondents (42%) say they are aware of the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU. Just over one in ten (12%) know what it is, while 30% have heard of it but don't really know what it is. There has been a slight increase in the awareness since 2012 (+3 percentage points), although the proportion of those who know what the Charter is has increased by 5 points.
- The COVID-19 pandemic has become a global emergency, with devastating consequences in terms of loss of life and hampering progress toward achieving the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.
